Materials Needed

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- Flashcards with pictures of family members.
- A family tree poster or diagram.
- A worksheet for matching pictures to words.
- Whiteboard and markers.
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Learning Objectives

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By the end of the lesson, students will:

- 1. Recognize and name common family members (e.g., father, mother, brother, sister).
- 2. Use vocabulary to describe their family.
- 3. Answer basic questions about family members (e.g., "Who is this?").

Warm-Up (5 minutes)	 Song: Sing a family-themed song (e.g., <i>"Finger Family"</i>): "Daddy finger, daddy finger, where are you? Here I am, here I am, how do you do?" Encourage students to join in and point to their own fingers while singing 	 Review Game: Show flashcards and ask students, "Who is this?" Students respond: "This is my brother."
2.Introductio n (10 minutes)	Activity 1: Introducing Family Members • Show flashcards with family	Activity 1: Asking About Family Members • Write on the board:
	 Show hashcards with family members (e.g., father, mother, brother, sister). Say the name of each family member and ask students to repeat: "This is a father. Say it with me: father." "This is a mother. Say it with me: mother." Activity 2: Family Tree Exploration Show a simple family tree diagram and explain the relationships: "This is the father. This is the mother. These are the children." Point to each figure and name the role. 	 Write on the board. "What is your father's name?" "His name is" Model a conversation: Teacher: "What is your father's name?" Student: "His name is John." Practice with other family members: "What is your mother's name?" → "Her name is Anna." Activity 2: Personalizing with Family Trees Show a family tree diagram and use it to ask questions: "What is your brother's name?"
3. Guided Practice (15 minutes)	 Activity 3: Matching Game Place flashcards of family members on the board. Say a family member's name (e.g., "sister") and have 	 Activity 3: Pair Practice Pair up students and give each pair a simple family tree (real or fictional). Students take turns asking and answering:

	 students match it to the correct flashcard. Activity 4: Sentence Practice Write simple sentences on the board: "This is my father." "This is my sister." Practice saying these sentences with students 	 "What is your sister's name?" "Her name is Lily." Activity 4: Role Play Game Assign roles to students (e.g., father, mother, brother). Ask questions like: "What is your name?" → "My name is Peter." "Who are you?" → "I am
4. Independent Practice (10 minutes)	 Activity 5: Worksheet Activity Provide a worksheet with pictures of family members and their names. Students match each picture to the correct name. 	Activity 5: Fill-in-the-Blank Worksheet • Provide a worksheet with questions like: • "What is your father's name?" • "What is your mother's name?"
5. Wrap-Up and Assessment (5 minutes)	 Activity 6: Quick Recap Game Point to a flashcard and ask, "Who is this?" Students respond: "This is a brother." Exit Ticket: Each student names one family member before leaving: "This is my mother." 	 Activity 6: Sharing About Families Ask each student to share one sentence about their family: "My sister's name is Sarah." Exit Ticket: Each student answers a question before leaving: "What is your father's name?" → "His name is John."
