- A sorting worksheet for fruits and vegetables.

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Learning Objectives

Lesson Objectives

By the end of the lesson, students will:

- 1. Recognize and name common fruits and vegetables (e.g., apple, banana, carrot, potato).
- 2. Categorize items as fruits or vegetables.
- 3. Use simple sentences to describe items (e.g., "This is an apple."
- 4. Ask and answer questions about preferences using "Do you like _?"
- 5. Respond with "Yes, I do." or "No, I don't."

Warm-Up (5 minutes)	• Game: Begin with a guessing game. Hold up a real fruit or vegetable (e.g., apple) and say, "What is this?" Encourage guesses.	 Review Game: Show flashcards from Lesson 1 and ask, "What is this?" Students respond with the name and category. Question Practice:Introduce the question: "Do you like apples?" Model the answers: "Yes, I do." "No, I don't.
2.Introductio n (10 minutes)	 Activity 1: Naming Fruits and Vegetables Show flashcards of fruits and vegetables. Say the name of each item and ask students to repeat: "This is an apple. Say it with me: apple." Introduce 5–6 items (e.g., apple, banana, orange, carrot, potato, broccoli). Activity 2: Categorizing Explain the difference between fruits and vegetables (fruits are sweet, vegetables are used in cooking). Ask students to categorize items as fruit or vegetable. 	Activity 1: Question and Answer Practice • Write on the board: • "Do you like?" • "Yes, I do." • "No, I don't." • Use a flashcard to model: • Teacher: "Do you like bananas?" • Students: "Yes, I do!" Activity 2: Using Props • Hold a prop (e.g., apple) and ask students: "Do you like apples?" Encourage them to answer.
3. Guided Practice (15 minutes)	 Activity 3: Sorting Game Place flashcards or real items in a box. Call on students to pick an item, name it, and say if it's a 	 Activity 3: Pair Practice Pair up students. Give each pair a set of flashcards or props. Students take turns asking and answering questions:

	 fruit or vegetable: "This is a banana. It's a fruit." Activity 4: Sentence Practice Write simple sentences on the board: "This is an apple." "This is a carrot." Practice describing items with students. 	 "Do you like carrots?" "No, I don't." Activity 4: Classroom Survey Each student picks a fruit or vegetable flashcard. Students walk around asking classmates, "Do you like?" and record answers.
4. Independent Practice (10 minutes)	 Activity 5: Sorting Worksheet Distribute a worksheet with pictures of fruits and vegetables. Students categorize the items by drawing a line to the correct column (Fruit or Vegetable). 	 Activity 5: Worksheet Activity Provide a worksheet with pictures of fruits and vegetables. Students write their answers to "Do you like?" below each picture.
5. Wrap-Up and Assessment (5 minutes)	 Activity 6: Quick Recap Game Show flashcards randomly and ask students, "What is this?" Students respond: "This is a/an It's a fruit/vegetable." Exit Ticket: Each student names one fruit and one vegetable before leaving. 	 Activity 6: Quick Recap Point to a flashcard and ask one student, "Do you like?" Ask the class, "Who likes bananas? Raise your hand!" Exit Ticket: Each student answers one question: "Do you like?"
